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Faith for Earth: A Call for Action










According to Klaus Topfer, former director of the UN Environment Programme (UNEP), "We have entered a new age. An age where all of us will have to sign a new compact with our environment...and enter into the larger community of all living beings. A new sense of our communion with planet Earth must enter our minds."

Faith for Earth: A Call for Action is a collaborative effort between UNEP and the World Parliament of Religions. Based on the belief that religions are the consciousness of humanity, this endeavor is a call to harness the

moral authority of every faith tradition to save our planet,.

According to UNEP "Spiritual values for more than 80% of the people living on earth



have been driving individual behaviors. In many countries, spiritual beliefs and religions are main drivers for cultural values, social inclusion, political engagement, and economic prosperity."

"in the last 60 years, more than 40% of the world's civil wars have been linked to control over natural resources such as oil, land and water." They also note that "climate change continues to be one of the most systemic environmental threats that humankind has ever faced" and that a common ethical system of values is needed among the world's multiple religious traditions.

Sustainability across the Curriculum

The Catholic Climate Covenant awarded EarthConnection a \$1,000 grant to develop and present a program for elementary teachers on "Sustainability across the Curriculum".

The grant enables the program to be offered for free at elementary schools in the greater Cincinnati area on individual school sites as an in-service or at presentations on the topic given at EarthConnection. Programs can vary in length from one to three hours.

Those offered at EarthConnection for three hours will enable teachers in the Archdiocesan schools to earn a certificate recognized by the school office to-

wards their professional development.

These workshops are designed to give teachers both information and tools to integrate sustainability in all subject areas.

world's religious and spiritual communities and foster their engagement with the world and its guiding institutions in order to achieve a just, peaceful and sustainable world."

Together UNEP and the World Parliament of Religions are calling for interfaith collaboration to transform human consciousness. They believe that faith communities have a key role to play and must begin to use their moral voices for global action and engage in campaigns to change consumer habits.

The document *Faith for Earth: A Call for Action* provides an overview of the beliefs of indigenous peoples as well as multiple faith traditions throughout the world about their responsibility to care for creation.

Points of agreement among all

of the traditions include:

*The natural world has value in itself and does not exist solely to serve human needs.

*There is a significant continuity of being between human and non-human living beings, even though humans do have a distinctive role. This continuity can be felt and experienced.

*Non-human living beings are morally significant, in the eyes of God and/or in the cosmic order. They have their own unique relations to God, and their own places in the cosmic order.

*The dependence of human life on the natural world can and should be acknowledged in ritual and other expressions of appreciation and gratitude.

*Moral norms such as justice, compassion and reciprocity apply both to human beings and to non-human beings. The well-being of humans and the wellbeing of non-human beings are inseparably connected.

*There are legitimate and illegitimate uses of nature.

*Greed and destruction are condemned. Restraint and protection are commended.

*Human beings are obliged to be aware and responsible for living in harmony. with the natural world, and should follow the specific practices for this prescribed by their traditions.

This summer EarthConnection (EC) has embarked on a number of land-scaping projects on EC property.

The new benches and tables are from Green Tree Plastics and are made out of recycled plastic caps and lids. The collection of the caps and lids was a project initially started with the Girl Scouts, but people throughout the country saw the initiative on our website (www.scearthconnection.org) and contributed to the project. Caps and lids have arrived from more than 17 states from California to

New York and multiple states in between.

In addition to the plastic lids, there is a cost for each of the tables and benches. A number of people have contributed the fee and asked to dedicate the table or bench in memory of a family member or to mark a special occasion in someone's life.

The Associates in Florida dedicated one to Sr. Mary Loyola in honor of her 100th birthday and Sr. Annie Klapheke's family chose to buy one to mark Sr. Annie's final vows.

EarthConnection offers a number of programs in our facility, but also engages with multiple organizations off campus through speaking engagements and participation in local, national and international environmental initiatives.

Sr. Cj is currently a co-chair of the Faith Communities Go Green initiative (fcgg.org) which is a collaboration between Green Umbrella and Equasion to encourage collaboration among religious denominations to work together to create a more sustainable and equitable future for all by mobilizing their moral voice to reduce the risk of catastrophic climate change.

She facilitated a panel at the Midwest Regional Sustainability Summit (MRSS) and the Festival of Faiths on forming congregational Green Teams and gave a presentation at the Festival of Faiths on the UN/World Parliament of Religions initiative on Faith for Earth.
